Dear Friends,

As a volunteer and supporter, I am writing to remind you of what Westie Rescue and Placement (WRAP) of Northern California does and what is needed to continue in the future. Since our founding in 2016, we have rescued and placed 66 Westies. Last year alone we rescued and placed 21 Westies!


Some of the Westies we rescue are abandoned from puppy mills. For example, Christie came into our rescue when a good samaritan saved her



from being put down because she was no longer producing puppies and contacted WRAP. Christie had been kept in a cage in a warehouse for most of her five years. She had ear infections, several bad teeth, was in heat when she arrived and was very confused and scared of people; though she seemed to really like other dogs. She didn't know how to walk on a leash, didn't know how to potty outside (but she learned that in two days), had never walked on grass, never seen stairs, and didn't know how to accept affection or how to play. With patience and understanding her foster

dad (who later adopted her), worked with her to socialize her and to teach her good canine behavior. Christie now lives happily with her Dad, and an older Westie sister. She has learned to play and be joyful, loves her Dad and Westie sister and is a treat to have ground.

On July 8, 2018, Kiki was found wandering the streets of an east Contra Costa city. She had been used for breeding. She had severe skin problems: no fur! She was starving. She had two large breast tumors. After proper skin care, nutrition, and two surgeries, Kiki blossomed into an energetic Westie! Below is a before and after picture of Kiki.





Sometimes we assist families in placing Westies after their owner can no longer care for them. For example, Sam was a nearly 14-year-old Westie



whose 85-year-old Dad had a stroke and went into a nursing home. While there, his family put Sam in a kennel, in hopes that his Dad would recover. 8 months went by and his Dad succumbed to his illness, so the family surrendered him a WRAP foster Dad, who adopted him. Sam was able to live out his days in a loving home until he was almost 15 and was discovered to have widespread cancer. His new Dad was terribly saddened to learn this, but was very thankful that he'd

been able to take care of sweet Sam in his old age.

Sometimes we assist families in placing Westies after the owners have their first human children. As many of you may know, little children can be incompatible with dogs especially when hair pulling is greeted with a nip. This happened to Marty...Marty was the ripe old age of 10 when he came to WRAP. His mom and dad had a baby who was now two years old and running around grabbing at him to hug him. Marty liked the attention but the grabbing not so much... He now lives with a retired couple in a two dog home. He's a very happy boy and loves his yard and his walks and his doggy sister.

Since 2016 we have also been very busy fundraising. This is needed to pay for the food and any required surgery or medical care that our rescues need while they are in foster care and before being adopted. To fund this activity, we have held 1-2 auctions per year. Each auction raises approximately \$10,000. We are grateful for the many donations of products for the auctions that we receive.

We have a very small, incredible team of volunteers (some still working and some retired) that continue to expend incredible compassion and energy. That is the good news. The unfortunate news is that we are running out of steam and need more help. And we need it soon!

To rescue a Westie, there are four steps:

- 1. Finding the dogs and making sure they are Westies or Westie mixes!
- 2. Picking up the dog. We drive all over Northern California. Trust me, the shelters know of WRAP!
- 3. Fostering the Westie. This is where we need the most help, and it can often be needed on short notice. Please understand that the vast majority of fosters run a maximum of two weeks. We often don't know much about the dog, so it's good to have them fostered for a bit so we learn more about them before placing them in the best forever home.
- 4. Finding a good home. We are highly gratified when we see a happy Westie family!

We desperately need FOSTER HOMES that will take dogs on short notice. Especially homes in the Bay Area. Barbara cannot pull Westies from the shelters if we do not have a place for them. Last year, my husband and I fostered three Westies-I tell you this to share our experience. Rarely does the call to foster come at a convenient time, but I know if Barbara calls, she really needs our help. Fostering does not have to be a major disruption in the home. I have found that if I stay calm and keep order in the pack—things go well. And, no matter whether it has been two weeks, two months, or two days--- we always cry when they leave. Later, when we see pictures of them in their new homes, thriving and playing, we know we contributed to the well-being and life of another Westie and it makes us smile!

We need help with FUND RAISING. We do not have another Westie Facebook Auction scheduled. These auctions are a major source of income for WRAP. But we simply cannot do another auction with the same 3-4 people doing all of the work. They need a rest.

We have heard previously that many of you either have privacy concerns or do not know how to use Facebook for auctions. Here are some Facebook learnings I have had:

- You can create a Facebook account with an alias name and information to protect your privacy.
- It is easy to use Facebook. None of us knew how to use Facebook to do an auction the first time—but we had Westie Women from outside of CA teach/guide us. And now, we can teach you. We just need your time.

It makes my heart heavy to think about what happens if WRAP dissolves. What happens to the Westies in the shelters? The Westies whose owner must go into assisted living? The Westie whose owners had a baby....

We will provide coffee and sweets for the early birds. Lunch will be potluck style, so bring your favorite side dish. Cold beverages and dessert will also be provided by WRAP!

FROM the KITCHEN

INGREDIENTS:

- 2/3 cup pumpkin puree
- 1/4 cup peanut butter
- 2 large eggs
- 3 cups whole wheat flour, or more, as needed

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a silicone baking mat; set aside.
- 2. In the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat pumpkin puree, peanut butter and eggs on medium-high until well combined, about 1-2 minutes. Gradually add 2 1/2 cups flour at low speed, beating just until incorporated. Add an additional 1/4 cup flour at a time just until the dough is no longer sticky.
- 3. Working on a lightly floured surface, knead the dough 3-4 times until it comes together. Using a rolling pin, roll the dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Using cookie cutters, cut out desired shapes and place onto the prepared baking sheet.
- 4. Place into oven and bake until the edges are golden brown, about 20-25 minutes.*
- 5. Let cool completely.

NOTES:

*Baking time will vary depending on the size and thickness of the treats. Serving size will also vary depending on the desired shapes and cookie cutters used.
