

Apple pupcakes

Ingredients

- 2 ¾ cups water
- ¼ cup applesauce (unsweetened)
- 2 tbsp honey
- 1/8 tbsp vanilla extract
- 1 medium egg



- 4 cups whole wheat flour or other flour substitute
- 1 cup dried apple chips (unsweetened)
- 1 tbsp baking powder

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- 2. Mix water, applesauce, honey, egg, and vanilla together in a bowl
- 3. Add remaining ingredients and mix until well blended
- 4. Pour into lightly greased muffin pans
- 5. Bake 1 1/4 hours


Christie's Story- Story of a Breeding Westie by Tony Devol

Christie has had a hard life up until now. For the first five years of her life she was a puppy mill breeder who never did anything but stay pregnant and pop out puppies. When she came into rescue she knew nothing about the outside world, had some very bad teeth, ear infections, hook worms and, compounding her misery, was in heat. She didn't know about walking on a leash, what grass was, going up and down stairs, taking treats from someone's hand, getting petted and loved, or any of the other things that doggies deserve to know about. She was scared of almost everything.

But, she's an amazing and brilliant girl! Within a very short time she learned a whole lot of stuff. She started making eye contact on the first day, became potty trained in three days, and learned her name shortly thereafter. Initially, she would scoot away and try to hide when I approached her, and had to be cornered to leash her up, put drops in her ears and all sorts of other things. Now, she lets people pet her and enjoys it, looks to me for reassurance and guidance, has learned all about going up and down stairs, and is so cute when she gets super excited at mealtime and then rolls around on her back in ecstasy after eating. She's even begun showing some interest in toys recently.

My doggies always sleep on the bed with me and, while she didn't mind being on the bed with her sister Terry, she had a big problem with being up there when I was there too, preferring to sleep in her crate, but in the past few days, with a lot of encouragement, she's stayed on the bed with us all night.

Sometimes I think she now plays keep-away now and then as sort of a game, but not nearly as much as she did in the beginning. She's gotten over almost all of her trust issues within a month, although I still try to be vigilant in case she gets spooked about something, and be ready to soothe and reassure her if something pops up. She's really a sweet soul, with plenty of Westitude as well, who's now been allowed to be herself for the first time in her life and makes more progress every day. With a lot of love and patience, this little girl has become a wonderful little Westie, and her new forever Dad and her big sister Terry just love her to pieces.

WESTIE HEALTH CORNER

Symptoms of Gluten Intolerance in Dogs by Unknown

Consumption of glutinous grains in sensitive pets, can lead to the following symptoms:

Chronic GI upset – intermittent or continuing diarrhea and/or constipation including mucusy stools. Vomiting may also occur in more severe cases.

Repetitive chewing at the feet - as well as red and inflamed paw pads.

Dermatitis – chronic dry and flaky skin, hair loss, redness, bumps, rashes, and constant scratching are classic signs of a food intolerance.

Chronic ear infections – over-consumption of grain can lead to a buildup of excess sugars in the system. This in turn can contribute to yeast overgrowth, leading to dark, smelly waxy debris in the ears, head shaking and scratching.

Other health problems that may be related to food intolerances such as grain sensitivity include: arthritis, epilepsy, abnormal behavior, allergic and inflammatory reactions, conditions like pancreatitis and hepatitis, as well as an increased susceptibility to infection, Cushing's, Addison's, and thyroid problems.

SOURCES OF GLUTEN:

- wheat, barley, rye, triticale - oats are considered questionable - oats are gluten-free but processed oats can be contaminated with gluten, while buckwheat, corn/maze and rice are gluten-free.

Certain grains contain molds or storage mites that can cause an allergic reaction.

FYI-corn gluten meal is a waste product from the human food industry used as a cheap low-quality protein and is a mark of a poor quality food.
